

PARISH NEWS ARTICLE

This is the text of the Trinity article that has been prepared by Rosie Berry for the August edition of the Knebworth Parish News. (*Ed.*)

Her name is Rhoda; she is just six years old and lives in a village in Malawi. How do I know this? I am her sponsor through World Vision, a Christian-based charity working throughout the world in many projects. Changing lives for good in some of the world's hardest places, helping whole communities grow healthier and stronger; equipping them with tools and knowledge to protect from Covid-19 and climate change. This is done by restoring landscapes, diversifying income and practising safe hygiene.

They help children thrive by improving access to water, sanitation and hygiene, which prevent the spread of diseases such as cholera, Covid-19, diarrhoea and other diseases. When children don't have to walk miles to fetch dirty water, they can play, learn and thrive like children should.

World Vision is there for disasters' youngest survivors, providing shelter, sanitation and psychosocial support - a space where they can play safely. Child marriage has been prevented and more children enabled to stay in school.

Last year, a five-year project in Zimbabwe completed, having successfully:

- Equipped 123,000 children with literacy, numeracy, financial and life skills
- Trained teachers, adult mentors and girl peer leaders in 300+ schools
- Given bicycles to students so they could travel to school safely
- Set up Community Learning Circles in lockdown when schools had to close
- Established 298 Child Protection Committees to help identify and report abuse

HOW?

Via the FCN Helpline, open every day of the year from 7.00 am to 11.00 pm

40 volunteers ensure there is a listening ear and who are able to call on local FCN branches such as Hertfordshire. Here cases are passed to volunteers who contact the client and seek to offer support from their own training and experience.

Herts FCN Group is co-ordinated by Brian Burgess, who has very wide farming contacts across the county, and visits farmers as a Help and Safety Officer. Peter Roberts, a supposed retired farmer, but who is frequently called in to assist on the family farm. Wendy Waygood, widow of Roger, who was a founder member of the group, and whose sons carry on the farm at Alderley. Gill Thwaites, a woman of many parts, who is involved in the County Suicide Prevention Team, and has been involved in a House of Lords investigation into isolation and loneliness in the countryside.

The group has recently been involved in cases of injuries sustained on the farm, of mental illness leading to threats of suicide and many cases of non-payments from the Rural Payments Agency, which can lead to serious financial problems for the farmers involved.

On behalf of the Herts FCN Group, I solicit your prayers and support.

Codicote Food Bank

Codicote Food Bank was set up during the pandemic and still operates from Codicote but it supports the wider villages including Knebworth, Woolmer Green, Welwyn, Whitwell and Kimpton which are often not easily accessible or covered by the larger town-based foodbanks.

Our local Co-op and butchers both have donation bins that are collected each week by a local volunteer. These are critical and if you can make a regular donation it is much appreciated. Staple items such as cereal, pasta and tinned items are always welcome.

Although relatively small, the foodbank has a large and committed group of volunteers, including Duke of Edinburgh students completing their volunteering.

We operate a walk-in service on a Wednesday evening from 6-7pm at the old Burgess shop on Codicote High Street. You don't need to share details other than the size of your family so we can provide you with some store cupboard staples. For those who find it difficult to make it, we do offer delivery.

METHODIST NEWS

Message from Rev'd Malcolm Peacock

In Ecclesiastes we are told there is time for everything under heaven, this is the time of year when many Methodist ministers, including myself, are moving on to different places. Always there are mixed feelings when moving on. There is sadness at leaving friends and churches. There is sadness and frustrations at leaving some things unfinished, part of the frustration is knowing that in leaving, pressure will be placed on the Circuit because there is no replacement for me. There is also a sense of anticipation and excitement at going to a new place.

I remember well about the anxiety I had going to my first appointment. We were going to live and work in the Caribbean. I had never flown, and I had never left the United Kingdom before we went, and I was anxious. On arrival we were met by my new Superintendent and told we were going to celebrate his son's birthday and his son had chosen the restaurant. We ended up going to Kentucky Fried Chicken. It tasted like every KFC I have ever had. I realised that if KFC was the same the world over then our God, who is unchanging, will be the same wherever we are.

The certainty of the presence of God and the unchanging nature of God brings reassurance and comfort in all situations. I know that the God who is God of love, compassion and mercy who knows the needs of his people and who unfailingly meets the needs of his people will be present here when I leave and waiting for me when I arrive in a new place. The consistency of that experience over many years simply deepens faith and trust in our God.

Things change, situations change and sometimes change feels hard. Change can make us feel uncomfortable and anxious - the certainty of our relationship with God and the certainty of God's unchanging love for his people allow us to face change with reassurance and comfort. The reality of change isn't taken away, but our capacity to cope with change is enhanced.

As I leave the Circuit, I know the sense of uncertainty that many will have and the wish that things might be different. I also know that God and his love for us are unchanging. I know too that God will lead us into different ways of being and even different ways of doing. That is the reality of life. Sometimes we wonder if there is hope and a future for the church as we know it, part of me wonders that too, but a bigger part of me is sure that the Church of God will never stop or fade away. It may transform, like a caterpillar to a butterfly, but it will remain as God's presence in God's world bringing the challenge of his kingdom, and I am privileged to have spent ten years here doing his work and I know I have the challenge of going on to do his work somewhere else.

God is good, all the time God is good.
