In recent weeks we have again experienced the sadness of losing much valued members of our church fellowship. The last stages of the lives of both Margaret Whittle and Betty Edwards show profound examples of selfless love of husbands (and families) taking on increasing responsibilities in home life, to manage, support and care as the slow decline of dementia took its relentless toll on their lives. We give thanks for the lives of Margaret and Betty and for all they have each meant to the Trinity fellowship, and to individuals and other members of community in their long and faithful lives. We continue to hold John and Paul and both families in prayer as they continue the journey of grieving.

Margaret Whittle moved to Knebworth in 2007, joining Trinity Church, and when we moved from the St Albans/Welwyn to the North Herts circuit, then joining with John the local group of Supernumerary (retired) ministers. Margaret's quiet and gentle friendship and her life skills have been generously shared with us over those years through worship, through help and baking for social events and her hands on support of the KFC children's Good Egg Club holiday outreach. She was a faithful member of the vibrant Meeting Point group, encouraging and nurturing both faith and friendships over many years. At her funeral service, led by Rev Zdzisiu Hendzel, and with the privilege of Margaret's talented brother playing the organ, we learned more of the first chapters of Margaret's fruitful and varied life, shared for over 60 years with John. Their son, Timothy, paid tribute to her on behalf of the family with insights to earlier years and the importance of the generations of their family life, and grandson Mason shared a profound thought-provoking poem "What is dying".

Some friends in Trinity have known Betty Edwards for many years as part of the community in Knebworth where she and Paul spent most of their 70 years of married life. The message from the King has pride of place on Paul's window ledge in Wymondley Care home where he is now receiving care. Church has been an integral part of Betty and Paul's life and they have played an active role in the life of Trinity fellowship since its formation, often accompanied by Natalie too. Since her move to Jubilee Court last year she left a gap but we each have our memories of her at services, at the Station Pub lunches, at Trinity Two-step, and at many social events, including an informal small post-covid fellowship group at Hilary and Richard's home providing valuable reconnection of members. Even in her final months at Jubilee Court, where she was so well cared for, she never lost the welcoming smile that lit up her face for familiar visitors.

Both these friends and fellow members have been part of what the fellowship in Trinity has grown into since its formation in 1996, and they each made their own remembered impact. Some of us recall their arrival in the church and the joy of welcoming new people. Let us give thanks for the difference they made and for the ways we support each other in loss, and also for new people who have walked through our doors over recent years, each bringing something that helps to encourage our belief in the Christian witness we might go on being in the local and the wider community.

May our branches be well rooted in the vine as we share God's love and as we live through changes.

Eulogy for Margaret Whittle by son Timothy from service on 25th March 2024

Margaret Rose was born to Beatrice and Jack Boydell in Warrington Hospital on October 14th 1934.

People often assumed that she was named after Princess Margaret Rose, an assumption to which she strongly objected, pointing out she was named after her grandmothers, one being Margaret, and yes, the other Rose. She was also quick to point out that she was born in Lancashire not Cheshire, as later boundary changes brought about. She refused to be seen as a Cheshire Cat!

At that time the family lived at Newton Hall Farm, a large Elizabethan-style farmhouse, built on the site of a much older house, which was said to have been visited by Queen Elizabeth 1st. Sadly, in the 1960s this house was acquired by developers and pulled down.

While Margaret was still young w**hen, with young brother Stan,** the family moved to Sand Hob Farm in Lowton, an even older building than Newton Hall Farm, and it too was destined to be knocked down, and replaced by a modern house.

Margaret went to St Peter's Anglican Primary school, and then, having taken the eleven plus, she went onto Newton Grammar school, where both her brothers, Stanley and John, would later become students, and where John later became Head of Music.

After grammar school, Margaret went off to teachers training college at Bletchley Park, and this began a teaching career which would see her teaching in Hayton Liverpool. However, her mother died and Margaret took over running the house.

Her teaching career continued following her marriage and she taught in the British Virgin Islands, Montserrat, St Kitts, and orthodox Jewish school in Leeds, and finally in Torquay. Her dedication was seen when in the year Ben was born, Mother taught to the end of the summer term, then on June 30th the baby was born and she was back teaching at the opening of the next term!

The Boydell family, which traces its roots back to Norman times, were strong Primitive Methodists, and were heavily involved in the Lane Head Methodist Chapel, where Margaret taught in the Sunday School from a young age, and also sang in the choir and at musical performances where she often played a leading role.

She was also a member of a youth group, part of a world-wide Christian Organization, Christian Endeavour. Other members of this group included a future High Anglican Priest and his wife, a Salvation Army Bandsman and his wife, and a future Methodist Minister sitting not a million miles away from where we are now...

John and Margaret first got together on planks as they helped with the repointing of the Sunday School building, and avoiding the attentions of passing wasps. The proposal, such as it was, came during carol-singing, which really was entering into the spirit of the season!

The couple were married in Lane Head Methodist Church on July 18th 1959, where three of their four children were later to be baptized, before this church too was demolished, continuing the seeming pattern in Margaret's life.

Margaret particularly enjoyed cooking and baking, following her mother, who before her own marriage was apparently in service to employers who thought her given name of Beatrice was 'too posh a name for a cook', so decided to call her Betty instead, presumably after the not-at-all-posh teashop of the same name in Harrogate!

Some of mum's cakes were masterpieces – I can recall a football pitch one, for I think one of my

earlier birthdays – I've had a few more since – which was outstanding, only lacking the Subuteo figures, as these were sadly unavailable in the Caribbean, not somewhere with much of a footballing tradition.

Margaret also loved to knit, for her children and grandchildren, but could also turn her hand to creating things, using materials other than wool, which was an extremely useful skill in the Caribbean – I can remember pirate and Red Indian party outfits, plus an award-winning Easter parade outfit, complete with cane and top hat I wore in Montserrat. I'm sure there was a photo of this last one, which I'm sure I wore with panache. I can claim that, as the photo seems to have disappeared.

Margaret spent a good deal of her time with children, in addition to her teaching, and her final work with children, was with the Good Egg Club, held here in Trinity, an ecumenical venture, which she was very proud to be involved with.

Always self-effacing, Margaret never wanted to be in the limelight, preferring always to be in the kitchen helping to prepare food, washing up, or just generally making sure that everything was running smoothly. Despite this retiring nature, she supported Dad throughout his ministry, always on hand with a warm welcome and a cup of tea, or cold water in the case of the Caribbean, and at times would step out of her comfort zone to take on the role of presiding at Women's Fellowship meetings, for which she was always characteristically well prepared.

This self-effacing nature also extended to this service today – 'You can bury me in a cardboard box' she said, 'and don't make a big fuss of it all KEEP IT SHORT'. Well, we haven't quite gone as far as the cardboard box idea, but I have made this eulogy short, in keeping with mum's wishes, and I should probably apologise to her for making the service as long as it has been! Don't blame the children, blame Dad!

Have you ever thought-"What will happen to your unbelieving friends and family?"

Is the answer really for them to suffer eternal punishment simply because they did not believe? And what of those who never had the opportunity to hear the Gospel Message? Are not many, or all the above, seemingly good people, who display kindness, and generosity to all they meet; indeed, are they not as moral as many believers, remembering -'all have sinned and fallen short of the Glory of God'?(ref.1)

Saved by faith-the foundation pillar of the Reformation-'not by works lest any should boast'(ref.1a) However, we need to remember that genuine faith bears the fruits of good works, patience, self-control etc., all seen by St. Paul as fruits of the indwelling Holy Spirit (ref.2). So St. James writes that faith without works is dead! (ref.3)

Salvation by faith cannot apply to those who have no faith at all (though all of us live by some kind of faith, otherwise we would never step onto a bus or plane!)

So is Corporal Frazier right when he cries-"We are all doomed!" at least those without faith? Well there is another approach in Scripture which seems to tell a different story. So, for example, St. John in the book of Revelation speaks of a 'Tree the leaves of which shall be for the healing of the nations.' (ref.4). In the 'Parable of the Sheep and the Goats' Jesus is reported as having said -'When the Son of Man comes in His glory—before Him, will be gathered all nations'(ref.5) The term 'nations' within the Bible refers to the Gentiles, those who are not Israelites. And who does Jesus say to 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world'? (ref.6) To those who say 'Lord Lord'? No! But to those who fed the hungry, gave drink to the thirsty, clothed the naked etc. No mention about believing, or of assent to a creed, simply good deeds.

However, you may point out these words are addressed to 'the righteous', who did good things to 'my brothers' (=family). Are not all Jesus' brothers and sisters' God's family? The righteous, I suggest, are those, who like Jesus displayed compassion and were motivated by a loving concern for others. I come back to what I see as a key text in the first epistle of John-'Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God.' (ref. 7) Earlier, in his letter John writes: 'he (Christ) is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world'. (ref. 8)

So it would seem the only condition for non-believers inheriting the kingdom is that they have done good works. So one writer, in The Expository Times concludes thus-'And so those Christians today who have concern for their friends, who are moral people and helpful to others in need, can be reassured. Take heart from the 'Parable of the sheep and goats'-they will not go unrewarded'.

You may then ask why be a Christian? Answer, to experience the love of Christ and see the world through the optics of the Kingdom of God. George Wade Robinson summed it up well in his hymn: 'Loved with everlasting love' I have over run the length of this article, so refer you to 452 Mission Praise or YouTube!

After our gathering, Knebworth Church Friends carried the cross around the village...more valuable outreach...thus symbolising that **together**, **we are stronger**. Thanks for the coming together and for all who took part.

WATER UNDER THE BRIDGE



A boy a long time ago leaned against the railing of a bridge and watched the current of the river below. A log, a bit of driftwood, a twig floated past. Again, the surface of the river was smooth. But always, as it had for a hundred, perhaps a thousand, perhaps even a million years, the water slipped by under the b bridge. Sometimes the current went more swiftly and again quite slowly, but always the river flowed under the bridge.

Watching the river that day, the boy made a discovery. It was not the discovery of a material thing, something he might put his hand upon. He could not even see it, he had discovered an idea. Quite suddenly, and yet quietly, he knew that everything in his life would someday pass under the bridge and be gone like the water.

The boy came to like those words WATER UNDER THE BRIDGE. All his life thereafter the idea served him well and carried him through. Although there were days and ways that were dark and not easy, always when he made a mistake that couldn't be helped, or lose something that could never come again, the boy, now a man, said "its water under the bridge" and he didn't worry unduly about his mistakes after that and he certainly didn't let them get him down, because It was WATER UNDER THE BRIDGE.

It is far better for the water that flows under the bridge to be filled with love and forgiveness therefore TODAY:

Mend a quarrel. Search out a forgotten friend. Dismiss suspicion and replace it with trust. Write a love letter. Share some treasure. Give a soft answer. Encourage youth. Manifest your lovalty in a word or deed.

Keep a promise. Find the time. Forego a grudge. Forgive an enemy. Examine your demands on others. Think first of someone else. Appreciate, be kind, be gentle. Laugh a little more. Listen. Apologise if you were wrong. Try to understand. Deserve confidence. Take pleasure in the beauty and wonder of the earth. Speak your love. Speak it again.

FINANCE NEWS: Trinity's Finances -in the red?

At our last church meeting, Alan Burrell reported on the current financial situation, repeating what had been said at the previous meeting, that Trinity's **yearly regular outgoings are** £10,000 in excess of its regular income. If this continues for a few more years we will need to plan to close before our money totally runs out.

This situation will not improve unless there is a plan of action to increase income and make savings. The scope for the latter is limited, as the costs for running the building are high. We

could appeal for an increase in giving, but splitting £10,000 between a maximum of 50 regular givers would mean £200 extra giving per person per year, so approximately £4 a week on top of what you normally give for church giving, apart from charity giving. Obviously not everyone is going to be able to do that, but we are asking people to consider what having your church is worth to you. Not everyone is fully aware of the enormous costs involved in keeping the building and our activities going, despite the fact that most of the background work being done is on a voluntary basis.

Any fund-raising ideas you have are welcome, but that also requires time and input. The church meeting has accepted a proposal from The Trinity Quarterly team, to ask people who receive the TQ to make a voluntary donation of 50 pence or £1 to help cover the printing costs. This will only be four times a year, and we hope you consider the TQ worth it. This issue will be the first one when we will put out a box for that when we hand out the newsletter.

A regular standing order is also a good way to help the church.

When sending one-off payments by bank transfer there is the opportunity to include a brief reference that will appear on the church's bank statement. There is no need to include the name associated with the senders account as that will appear anyway. So, the reference might be 'Offering', 'Donation'.

However, you are giving, please don't forget to 'Gift Aid' it if you are tax payer, as the church gets 25% on top of the amount you give.

KNEBWORTH FAMILY OF CHURCHES, INCORPORATING CHRISTIAN AID





<u>Christian Aid Week</u> Thanks to volunteers from across the Churches most of the village homes will have received a CAW envelope. Recipients have a choice of how to respond -via the buckets in the Cop or the Post Office, or they can gift on line and it will be credited to the Knebworth Christian Aid Committee, around £200 had been donated this way so far.

Normally, we hold a Christian Aid Service to begin the week, however, this year the following Sunday was Pentecost with a United Service. KFC at its annual meeting requested we plan for a 'Bring and Share Meal' at which the video produced for CAW could be shown and some prayers used from the CAW prepared order of service. As it turned out very few turned up for the meal, though those who did shared a very fine lunch with fellowship shared.

The Pentecost Service, which also marked the end of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity used an order of service prepared by the churches of the West African nation of Burkina Faso and printed by Churches Together in Britain and Ireland. It was interesting that present at our service were Revd. Stanslous Chatikobo, the new URC minister at Trinity, who is from Zimbabwe, Pastor Yinka Oduwole, Chair of KFC, and Pastor Andrew from the Passion for Christ Church, who I believe is also from Nigeria. Canon Daniel Cronin from St. Thomas Church took part, and the service was led by the Rev. Charles King. Other representatives of the member churches took part in the readings and prayers. The worship was greatly enriched by the singing of the Eden Consort. The theme of the service was 'Outreach to the stranger' based on a reading from Genesis in which Abraham offers food to strangers, and the reading of the story of the Good Samaritan who showed care to one he could have seen as an enemy. Pastor Oduwole in the address sought to encourage us to reach out in love to the wider community as he told of a conversation with his tax-driver to whom he told the parable. The offering amounted to £67 (including a donation via St Martin's card-reader).

Stop press; Over £2000 was raised in Knebworth for CA during the Christian Aid Week. Continuing the Ecumenical theme -Churches Together in Hertfordshire held their AGM at the Focolare Centre in Welwyn Garden City on Tuesday 25th May. Following a short business meeting at which it was announced that a new Ecumenical Facilitator has been appointed - the Revd. Dawn Savage, a Baptist Minister whose appointment includes Bedfordshire as well as Hertfordshire. That is good news because the post has been vacant for some time following the elevation of Doral Hayes to the role of Principal Officer for Ecumenical Development and Relations Churches Together in England.

Doral then gave the keynote address during which she informed her audience that Churches in Britain and Ireland now has 54 members and includes Orthodox congregations and over half its members are from the Pentecostal congregations. However, many church members do not see Ecumenism as central to the life of the church but rather as an 'add on'. We need to learn to think, act and love ecumenically and not just join in one off projects together.

CtiE has four working groups- a) Living with Diversity b) New housing areas c) Climate justice and peace d) Evangelism and Mission. The biggest challenge within and between congregations is the whole question of Human Sexuality.

Doral then spoke of attempts being made to involve the under 35s in the work of CtiE. Towards this goal there is the Bill Snelson Fund which makes grants available to those between the ages of 18-35 to travel abroad and experience the ecumenical scene in different cultures.

Finally, it worth noting that now we have an Ecumenical Facilitator member churches need to make sure they pay the dues of £15/church.


